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

# hat we have learned from our dialogues with women:

- ☐ Women are responsible for 40% of the world's food production, yet women constitute 3/4 of the world's malnourished.
- ☐ Women perform 2/3 of all work hours; yet women receive 1/10 of the world's income.
- ☐ In Brazil, 100,000 union women marched with their babies to free the imprisoned union leaders. Soldiers refused to fire.
- ☐ In South Korea, women factory workers successfully organized Sunday school children to boycott candy to protest working 360 days a year, 18 hours a day.
